

Codes of Conduct

For Players, Parents and Coaches

 Players will not use inappropriate language. Racket or ball abuse will not be tolerated. Members must wear suitable kit for training and match sessions, as agreed with the coach. Individuals must show the correct attitude and commitment. Players will treat and respect all equipment, officials, opposition and associated people in a way that they themselves would expect to be treated. Players should focus on every task to the highest level. Players will not mess around or distract other players. Junior members must show respect to their coaches, collect tennis balls when asked and be aware of the safety of others during training sessions. Members must pay any fees for training or events promptly. Players will treat the clubhouse and courts in a responsible way. When representing the Club/County players will behave in a manner that will not harm the reputation of themselves, tennis and the Club/County. 	 Support your son/daughter and aid the developmental process both on and off the court. Allow the coach and staff to run the programme free from external pressures or influences. Behave in a manner that sets a positive example for others. Use correct and proper language at all times. Respect all officials, players, coaches and associated people and behave to them in a way that they themselves would expect to be treated. Ensure that all appropriate fees are paid when due. Never force your child to take part in sport. Set a good example by recognising fair play and applauding the good performances of all. Never punish or belittle a child for losing or making mistakes. Publicly accept judgements made by officials. Be patient. Steady progression is unusual in children; children; peaks and plateaus are common. Your first question following any match should be "Did you enjoy it?" not "Did you win?" At no stage should you communicate with your child or interfere during a match - just enjoy the game and let officials take care of the rules! 	 Coaches should, at the outset, clarify with the players (and, where appropriate, the parents) exactly what is expected of them and what they are entitled to expect from their coach. Coaches must always promote the positive aspects of the sport (e.g. FAIR Play). Coaches must consistently display high standards
